Welcome Remarks by Chancellor:

The Chancellor (Chairman) welcomed the members of the First Court of the university to the meeting and expressed his gratitude to the members for sparing their valuable time from their busy schedule to participate and help the university in taking appropriate decisions. The Hon'ble Chancellor apprised the members that the university had made very good progress with the vision of the founder Vice Chancellor, Prof. Dr. Jai Rup Singh and with the hard work put in by the Teaching and Non Teaching staff of the university in a short span of less than five years.

He informed the members that the way present campus has been brought up and with the kind of investments that have gone in, the lease agreement for the university should have been for a period of at least 33 years and ideally for 99 years so that it could be utilised as City Campus of the university. He further informed the members that the construction work at the main campus to come up in 500 acres of land about 25 kms. from Bathinda is going to commence soon with the building plans almost ready.

The Chancellor emphasised on the fact that the university set up in the educationally backward region of the state has a national character and at the same time project the aspirations, culture and history of the local populace as has been depicted in the Museum set up by the university. The members were also informed of the initiatives taken by the university as far as social outreach activities were concerned by helping children from economically weaker sections, imparting computer training to Senior Citizens of the city, in setting up Biodiversity (Genetic Heritage) park, establishing Innovators Club and holding seminars to spread awareness on Cancer related issues amongst the local population.

Suggestions from the members of the Court for the improvement of the University performance

The following suggestions were put forth by the members:

Academics:

- (a) The courses offered must be reviewed from time to time as regards their marketability and emphasis could be shifted as per the market forces.
- (b) The offering of courses such as aeronautics and shipping etc. could be considered.
- (c) The course content and teaching methodologies of leading universities could be studied for improving the standards.
- (d) The teaching staff may be empowered through the process of decentralisation.
- (e) The issues and concerns of the local people may be addressed by interacting and involving them.
- (f) The ICT must be exploited fully to have interaction with sister institutions and share lectures/talks through systems like EduSAT and video conferencing.
- (g) The number of students may be increased to the potential of the university.
- (h) The best papers contributed by the university and reputed journals may be identified with a view to have research work published in a tocussed manner.
- The guidelines for writing dissertation/thesis could be further improved.
- (j) The interaction and collaboration with the institutions with whom the MoUs have been signed must be made mutually beneficial.

Faculty Induction:

(k) The strength of teaching staff especially the senior faculty could be enhanced by inviting retired teachers from neighbouring institutions and offering them suitable perks and privileges.

Resource Generation:

 The resources could be generated by having a policy encouraging sponsored projects from industry and consultancy by creating a separate unit in the university.

Campus Development:

- (m) The development of new campus to take into consideration water treatment and its usage through an STP, development of rainwater harvesting system to ensure optimum utilisation of water resources and ensuring zero discharge out of the campus. It was suggested that efforts should be made to invite one of the esteemed members of the Court Shri Rajinder Singh to consult him on optimum utilisation of water resources available from different sources and to address the water logging problems in the area
- (n) The campus to have all the facilities for differently enabled persons

and ensuring adequate drinking water for the students.

- (o) Renewable energy resources must be tapped to the fullest possible extent and the ozone studies in the area could be undertaken.
- (p) The main campus should have centralised Food Courts for boy and girl students near the hostels rather than separate messes for each hostel. Similarly the academic area should have cafeteria easily accessible to the students and staff. The residential areas should have Shopping Complex.



The Beginning


- University started functioning with the joining of the Prof. Dr. Jai Rup Singh as Vice Chancellor (28-02-2009 to 03-03-2014).
