

Special Seventeenth Meeting of the Executive Council was held on 7th September 2015 at Conference Room, Administrative Block, Central University of Punjab, Bathinda. The following members were present:

At the outset, Chairman and Vice-Chancellor, Central University of Punjab welcomed the members to the 17th Meeting of Executive Council and thanked them for sparing their time to be a part of the Foundation Stone Laying Ceremony by Smt. Smriti Zubin Irani, Hon'ble Minister of Human Resource Development at the main campus in presence of Sr. Parkash Singh Badal, Hon'ble Chief Minister, Punjab, Sr. Sukhbir Singh Badal, Deputy Chief Minister, Punjab and Smt.

Harsimrat Kaur Badal Hon'ble Minister of Food Processing. Chairman requested Secretary to present the Agenda Item to the Members for deliberations and decisions. Secretary, Dr. Pankaj Khare presented the Items in sequence.

To confirm the minutes of the Sixteenth Meeting of Executive Council held on 25th July 2015.

Secretary submitted to the EC that the minutes of the Sixteenth Meeting of Executive Council were circulated to all the members and no comments were received on the EC Minutes.

Item:17:2015:3

To present Report of the Vice Chancellor on the progress of the University.

The Vice-Chancellor presented the Progress of the University since the last Meeting of the Executive Council. A detailed presentation was made on the new admissions, joining of new faculty members, research activities at the University that has given a lead position to Central University of Punjab in terms of *h*-factor, citations, SCOPUS standing, amongst all newly established Central Universities. The presentation is **annexed at 17.2.**

The Council deliberated on the issue of less response for a few of the courses offered by the University. The Chairperson informed that these courses are introduced from academic session 2015-16 only. When a new course is initiated there is always low response in the beginning. As the faculty recruited for a Centre has many courses under them and they also guide students of other Centres under CBCS scheme (for optional courses), starting a course with less number of students may not be a burden on the university.

Executive Council after discussions unanimously resolved to accept the report and appreciate the progress of the University.

Accordingly, Ground Breaking Ceremony was held on 17th August 2015 where Hon'ble Chief Minister of Punjab, Sardar Prakash Singh Badal graced the occasion. On 7th September 2015, Foundation Stone Laying Ceremony was organized where the Chief Guest Hon'ble Union Minister of HRD, Madam Smriti Zubin Irani, graced the function in presence of Hon'ble Chief Minister of Punjab, S. Parkash Singh Badal; Hon'ble Deputy Chief Minister of Punjab, S. Sukbhir Singh Badal and Hon'ble Union Minister of Food Processing Industries, Mrs. Harsimrat Kaur. Many more dignitaries from Government of Punjab and Central Government also attended the function.

An expected expenditure on these two ceremonies as prepared by the University (Annexure-17.5) towards the ceremonies was approved by the Competent Authority. It was to the tune of Rs. 15 lacks to be met from Project Account. BAC, in its 26th Meeting held on 1st September 2015 allowed the expenditure.

To ratify taking of Hostel accommodation at VPO Ghudha on rent.

(Finance Committee, 10th meeting vide FC: Item:10:2015:5R)

The Secretary informed the members that keeping in view the response for admissions to its PG and Research programs from different parts of the country during session 2015-16 and shortfall of more than 100 hostel seats for the boys, as an interim measure the university has taken on rent the hostel of University College, Ghudha (Punjabi University, Patiala) on temporary basis on a monthly rent of Rs. 1,88,500/- as per rent passed by the local administration.

(Academic Council, 8th Meeting vide AC: Item:8:2015:10R)

The members were also informed that the University however retained this hostel only for a month. It will be vacated in a day or so as the Porta Cabins for Boys' hostel are ready for physical possession at the City Campus itself.

Executive Council ratified the renting of hostel accommodation for boys students at VPO Ghudha for a month at rent of Rs. 1,88,500/- (plus nominal other expenditure) and appreciated that the students are being adjusted on the campus.

Item:17:2015:9

To ratify the pattern of Examination System to be implemented in CUPB from session 2015-16.

(Academic Council, 8th Meeting vide AC: Item:8:2015:4C)

The Secretary informed the EC that the following evaluation procedure, as per the Rules & Regulations of Master's degree programmes has already been approved by the Academic Council and Executive Council:

1. Surprise Test(s): Four or more such tests with multiple choice questions for each theory course.
2. Continuous Assessment: Continuous Assessment will be based on two pre-announced Tests having both short answer subjective type and one Long answer type subjective question, term papers, assignments, practical etc.
3. End Term Examination: Having multiple choice questions



The university needs to further define the respective weightage of surprise tests, Mid Semester tests and End Semester Examinations as proposed below:

1. Surprise Test(s): There will be four surprise tests, out of four, the best two will be considered. Surprise test will be of multiple choice questions and total weightage of surprise tests will be 25%
2. Mid Semester Tests (MST): Based on two pre-announced Tests. These tests will be subjective type and will contain short answer type questions and one Long answer type question. Each MST will carry 25% weightage and total weightage of MSTs will be of 50% of total scores of theory papers.
3. End Semester Examination: End semester examination will be conducted online in university computer centre. End Semester examination will be based on MCQs/fill-ups. Weightage of end semester examination will be of 25%. This examination, a student can retake after re-registration & payment of fee of Rs. 500 per exam.

The Examination pattern for the students admitted prior to session 2015-16 will remain unchanged.

The Executive Council unanimously resolved to approve the above pattern of Examination System to be implemented in CUPB from session 2015-16 which is duly approved by Academic Council in its 8th meeting dated 07.09.2015.

To ratify change of name of the Centre for Law to Centre for Legal Studies and Research.

The EC considered the change of name of the Centre for Law to Centre for Legal Studies as proposed by the Secretary.

The Chairperson informed that the Board of Studies has recommended the change of nomenclature of the Centre to Centre for Legal Studies and Research in its meeting dated November 8, 2014. The Academic Council deliberated on the matter and has unanimously resolved to approve the change of



nomenclature as proposed vide item no.

The Secretary informed the EC that in response to invitation of proposals for establishment of Community Colleges under the scheme by UGC Vide letter No. F. No. 1-1/2013 (CC) dated 30-3-2015, the university had applied on 27.4.2015 for the following:

1. Certificate course in Communication Skill and Personality development
2. Diploma in Green farming technologies
3. Advanced diploma in Sustainable farming and allied technologies.

The UGC has approved the Diploma in Green Farming Technologies under this scheme, vide Sr. No. 81 of UGC notification and also approved the grant of Rs. 65.96 lakhs vide letter D.O. No. F.1-81/2015 (CC) dated 11.6.2015.

The Chairperson apprised the EC that there was a very good response and the university started the "Diploma in Green Farming Technologies" with 40 seats from academic session 2015-16 as per details at Annexure-17.7.

Secretary presented a Centre-wise internal allocation of the funds for the financial year 2015-16 for the information of the Finance Committee. It is first effort to allocate some limit for expenditures to the Centres and other Units of the University. The expenditure will be done following the prescribed GFR. This allocation is meant for limiting the expenditure on one hand while imparting partial independence, on the other.

The Finance Committee appreciated the efforts while noting the limits of the budgetary allocations vide item no. Item: 10:2015:8.

The EC also appreciated and noted the limits of the budgetary allocations.

The Secretary informed the EC about the status of admission for session 2015-16 on the basis of the result of Central Universities Common Entrance Test (CUCET 2015).

The EC observed less response in a few of the courses offered by the University and suggested that university may fill these seats by conducting admissions by constituting a committee to critically examine such programmes vis-à-vis the registration. During discussion, it was felt that as the earlier courses offered by the University were not getting much response as far as placements is concerned, these programmes were split/renamed into more acceptable and in demand courses. The new courses



are being offered for the first time and seats for most of them are already filled. The other few courses with lesser intake will still be started keeping in view inflow of students from other programs taking these courses as their optional course.

It was brought to the notice of the members that in contrast to the 192 students admitted last year (2014-15), this session (2015-16), 439 students have been admitted. This excludes 34 Ph.D. students admitted this year.

Academic Council after discussions, has resolved to approve the report on the Status of admission for session 2015-16 for both Postgraduate courses/Programmes and Ph.D. Programmes.

Executive Council resolved the recommendation of Academic Council and report on the Status of admission for session 2015-16 for both Postgraduate courses/Programmes and Ph.D. Programmes.

The Secretary informed that the university has entered into Memorandum of Understanding with the University of Saskatchewan, Department of Plant Sciences, Canada on 12th June 2015 for a period of three years. Through this MoU the university looks forward to promote mutual cooperation in research and education through joint programmes and exchange of faculty and students.

Relative h-index of New Central Universities







- a) **Display of Project details:** The meeting appreciated the efforts of the university to make the project implementation a transparent process by displaying all the project details during foundation laying ceremony for dignitaries and the general peoples of local area.
- b) **Identification of site for ceremonial concrete pour:** The foundation of Residential block A is unanimously selected for ceremonial laying of foundation concrete keeping in view the safety of dignitaries.
- c) **Any other items as the decision of committee:** The university informed the meeting that Smt. Mr. Sanjay Jain, EIL also informed that 14 No. Technical staff along the Site-in-Charge will be deployed up to 15th September, 2015. Mr. Jain also agreed that CV of technical staff will also be approved shortly.

Meeting pointed out that:

The meeting informed that the EIL should provide staff as per site requirement. EIL should also submit hierarchy of the powers of officers for taking issues at appropriately level by CUPB. The change in representative should also be avoided as it affects the performances accordingly.

Item No. BAC:26:2015:7 Releasing payments to PSDA & EIL for the work completed by them and progress submitted.

- a) EIL has recommended the payment of PSDA, Architect after withholding amounts for till date pending activities (refer annexure- E)

The meeting pointed out that since there is serious delay in handing over the drawings to the contractor, the warning should be issued to the Architect firm in this regard. EIL should look into the delay of issuance of the drawings in case the delay is attributable to the Architect firm, necessary action should be initiated to impose liquidated damages for time being the payment may be released withholding 10% of the total contract price on account of
Liquidated damages

- b) EIL has submitted bill amounting to Rs. 4,57,476/- based upon new allotment of tender (refer annexure-F).

Meeting reviewed the bill amounting Rs. 4,57,476/- submitted by EIL and committee recommend the payment

- c) Since the architect firm M/s. PSDA and PMC firm EIL have failed to provide the detailed drawings to be issued to the contractor due to which the work has suffered, but there is no clause in their agreement to impose penalty.

PSDA informed that drawings are under process. The Architectural and Structural drawings will be submitted on 10-09-2015 positively.

The committee has also informed that if contractor want to bore well at site then the necessary approval has to be taken from Govt. by the contractor
3. **Issuance of Good For Construction Drawings:** Committee members informed to EIL & PSDA that Good for Construction drawings shall be issued to the contractor by EIL after proof checking the same. EIL will submit one set of good for construction drawings duly signed by the competent person along with detailed calculations and soft copies etc. supporting design approval to Executive Engineer of CUPB only for record and release of payment purposes. The responsibility of correctness of design shall be of EIL. Mr. Sanjay Jain, Project Manager agreed to follow the procedure.
4. **Detailed cost estimate based upon allotted rates:** Executive Engineer CUPB submitted that Since the tender has been allotted, the rates are fixed, there are some new taxes and some unforeseen items may coming up the PSDA and EIL should have submit the realistic cost estimate normally called estimate on allotted rates.



Community College Scheme

India is an agriculture driven economy. Nearly 80% population is directly or indirectly dependent on the agriculture for earning their livelihood. Hence, it is a vital sector for the development and economic growth of a country and is critical for socio-economic development of rural areas. The second green revolution benefitted the country by increase in agricultural yield but it lead to many environmental and health issues due to continues and indiscriminate use of synthetic chemicals (pesticides, fertilizers, soil nutrients etc), old irrigation techniques.

Need have arisen for use of natural products as pesticides, fertilizers, soil nutrients along with sustainable farming techniques like micro-irrigation, green house, happy seeder etc. in agriculture. Building skills, competencies and capacity of the human resources is receiving priority in addressing the challenges facing Indian agriculture. Given the diversity of Indian agriculture, the demographic profile of our population and more importantly, the scale at which it is required, the conventional methods of capacity building will be of little use. There is worldwide shift from conventional education system to competence based qualification system.

The Malwa region of Punjab where the Central University of Punjab is located is hub of agriculture and is known as "bread bowl of India". The unorganized and intensive agriculture has led to may environmental, health and socioeconomic issues in this region. With the objective to provide specialist manpower to meet the challenges of the agriculture sector in this region, the University has started Diploma in Green Farming Technologies" under the UGC scheme for Community Colleges from the session 2015. Initially UGC has granted a funding of Rs. 65.96 lakh for the two years. The Curricula and system of certification of the diploma course will align with the National Occupational Standards and National Skills Qualification Framework (NSQF) of Govt. of India.

The broad objectives of the Diploma course are:

- a) to make higher education relevant to the learner and the community;
- b) to integrate relevant skills into the higher education system;
- c) to provide skill based education to students currently pursuing higher education but actually interested in entering the workforce at the earliest opportunity;
- d) to provide employable and certifiable skills based on National Occupational Standards (NOSs) with necessary general education to Senior Secondary School pass-outs, with general education and /or vocational education background.
- e) to provide for up-gradation and certification of traditional / acquired skills of the learners irrespective of their age;
- f) to provide opportunities for community-based life-long learning by offering courses of general interest to the community for personal development and interest;
- g) to provide opportunity for vertical mobility to move to higher education in future; and to offer bridge courses to certificate holders of general / vocational education, so as to bring them at par with appropriate NSQF level.
- h) to provide entrepreneurial orientation along with required skill training for self-employment and entrepreneurship development.

M.Phil. Degree Programme

Rules and Regulations (Applicable w.e.f. academic session 2015-16)

{Sub – section (1) (b) of Section 28 of the Central Universities Act, 2009}

1. TITLE AND COMMENCEMENT

1.1 These rules and regulations shall be called the Rules and Regulations of M.Phil. Degree Programme hereinafter referred to as the Programme, and shall be applicable to all the M.Phil. Degree programmes unless otherwise stated.

1.2 Subject to the overall control of the Academic Council, the programme shall be administered by the concerned School/Centre.

1.3 These rules and regulations shall come into force with academic session 2015-16.

2. DURATION

2.1 Unless otherwise provided in the statutes governing M.Phil. Degree Programme, the minimum duration for completion of each M.Phil. Degree Programme shall be 03 semesters and the maximum duration shall be 5 semesters.

2.2 In respect of candidates who had discontinued for a valid reason (with the permission of competent authority) and are readmitted to the programme by the School, the period for which such candidates had discontinued shall not be counted while calculating the maximum period as prescribed in clause 2.1

2.3 A semester (s) may be declared a zero semester (s) in case of a student who could not continue with the programme during that period due to illness and hospitalization or due to accepting a foreign scholarship/fellowship or any other valid reason accepted by the vice chancellor subject to the fulfillment of requirements as laid down by the relevant rules. Such zero semester (s) shall not be counted for calculation of the duration of the programme in case of such a student.

3. NUMBER OF SEATS

The number of seats in each M.Phil. programme, shall be as approved by the statutory bodies of the university.

4. ADMISSION CRITERIA

4.1 Admission of a candidate to the programme would be made only in its first semester. He/she shall be promoted to the subsequent semesters of the programme after completing necessary formalities as specified under clause 8.

4.2. In exceptional cases lateral entry of a candidate, shall be considered for admission to a later semester of any programme following the prescribed procedure.

4.3 International students may be admitted to this programme according to the policy guidelines laid down by the university.

4.4 No candidate shall be eligible for admission to the programme if he/she is already registered for any other full time programme of this university or any other university/Institute.

Note: However, students admitted to evening Post Graduate Diploma Programmes shall be permitted to pursue any regular programme in other institutions. Students admitted to a regular programme in the university shall also be permitted to pursue part-time evening Certificate/Diploma Programmes of professional nature in the university or other institutions, provided that permission has been obtained from competent authority of the university.

4.5 No candidate admitted to this programme shall undertake any employment or join any other course of study before completing the minimum residency period as may be decided by the university.

5. ELIGIBILITY FOR ADMISSION

5.1 A candidate shall be eligible for admission to the programme in any discipline provided he/she fulfills the minimum eligibility conditions as notified by the university.

5.2 For SC/ST/OBC and persons with disabilities (PWD) candidates, relaxation in minimum eligibility shall be given as per policy of the Government of India and the guidelines of the UGC.

5.3 The policy of the Government of India and the guidelines of the UGC, regarding reservation of seats for candidates belonging to Scheduled Castes, Scheduled Tribes, OBCs and for persons with disabilities(PWD) candidates shall be implemented.

6. PROCEDURE FOR ADMISSION

6.1 As per Academic Calendar, the University shall invite applications from eligible candidates for admission to the programme in each academic session, giving details of the academic calendar, number of seats available, eligibility criteria, prescribed fees, etc.

6.2 Admission for the programme shall be advertised in leading newspapers at the national level and also on the university website.

6.3 The admission to the programme shall be made on the basis of the entrance test to be conducted by the university as per a schedule to be notified for the purpose and/or score in qualifying degree/examination or as decided by the statutory bodies of the university. The entrance test shall be conducted at national level at the

designated centers to be decided by the university, depending upon the number of students opting for a centre.

6.4 The selected candidates shall submit the prescribed fee and other relevant documents to the university within the stipulated time.

7. PROGRAMME STRUCTURE

7.1 University shall follow a Choice Based Credit System (CBCS) in all its M.Phil. Programmes. The programme shall consist of at least 50 credits covering theory and practical courses, a compulsory seminar and dissertation research/industrial project in the relevant discipline.

7.2 The 50 credit hours course work shall be split into Core, Elective and Foundation courses as per the requirement of CBCS.

7.3 The credit requirement for professional Programmes M.Tech. and M.Pharm. shall be determined as per requirements of respective National Regulatory bodies for these programmes.

7.4 Subject to the approval of Academic Council, the syllabus for the courses and the methodology and instructional designs to be used shall be prepared/prescribed and published by the respective School Boards.

7.5 A candidate may be required to take additional noncredit courses on the recommendation of Supervisor, Coordinator of Centre and Dean of the concerned School. The marks for such courses shall not be counted towards Cumulative Grade Points Average (CGPA).

7.6 The evaluation of dissertation shall be done as per Clause 16 and marks shall be awarded.

7.7 Subject to the approval of the Academic Council, the syllabus for the courses and the methodology and instructional designs to be used shall be prepared, prescribed and published by the respective School Boards.

7.8 The topic of the dissertation shall be approved by the School/Center on a proposal submitted by the student through his/her supervisor.

7.9 The topic of dissertation, once decided shall ordinarily remain unchanged during the whole programme. However, the Dean of the concerned School on the recommendations of Centre Coordinator and supervisor of the student may permit a modification in the topic, if considered necessary. Major changes can be made in the topic only after the approval by the Vice Chancellor.

7.10 A student who does a part of his/her dissertation work at any centre other than the centre concerned (External Centre) shall be required to submit a progress report on the work carried out by him/her as well as a certificate regarding regular

attendance at the External Centre duly approved by the external supervisor (s) as well as by the internal supervisor (s).

8. REGISTRATION AND PROMOTION TO THE NEXT SEMESTER

8.1 Every student admitted to the programme shall get registered at the beginning of the 1st semester of the programme in the Centre/School by completing the necessary formalities as per the schedule announced by the university.

8.2 A student shall be promoted and permitted to get registered in the next semester provided he/she:

8.2.1 Fulfils the prescribed requirements of continuous internal assessment/project work/practical work as required under the regulations.

8.2.2 Passes at least 50% of courses in the semester concerned.

8.2.3 Puts in required attendance in each course/semester as provided under clause 9.

8.3 A student found not eligible to appear in the End-Semester Examination of a course of the programme due to shortage of attendance or those who fail in more than 50% of the prescribed courses in any semester shall be required to repeat the course(s) and take readmission in respective semester of the programme in the following academic year.

8.4 A student shall not be permitted to register in a subsequent semester of a programme unless he/she has been a registered student of the immediate preceding semester and has pursued the course (s) of that semester as a regular student.

8.5 In each semester, a last date shall be fixed and notified in the beginning of the semester after which admissions/re-admissions/promotion/registration shall not be ordinarily made.

8.6 Under special circumstances, the students may be allowed late registration by a specified date, by paying a late fee fixed for the purpose, along with the other prescribed fees.

9. ATTENDANCE

9.1 A candidate to be eligible for Continuous Internal Assessment/End Semester Examination of a course or a complete semester shall have to put in a minimum of 75% attendance in that course/semester in addition to satisfying all other relevant conditions laid down in the regulations.

9.2 The Dean of School, on recommendation of the Centre Coordinator concerned, may condone the shortage of attendance to a maximum of 5% if the claim is justified and supported by valid documents and on payment of fine as approved by competent authority.

9.3 The Dean Academic Affairs, on recommendation of the Centre Coordinator and Dean of the School may condone shortage of attendance beyond 5% but only up to a maximum of 10% for valid reasons (to be supported by documentary evidence) and on payment of fine as approved by the competent authority.

9.4 The teacher concerned shall be responsible for maintaining the record of attendance of the students registered for the course.

10. SUSPENSION/WITHDRAWAL

A student suspended or debarred from attending the classes due to any reason, whatsoever, or having withdrawn from a semester (s) on medical grounds or for any other cogent reason, shall have to seek re-admission in the appropriate semester in the next academic session as a regular student. Such students shall have to meet the prescribed requirement of attendance in each course in the semester.

11. FEES TO BE PAID

The amount and mode of payment of fees payable at the time of admission, registration during subsequent semesters, at the time of examination and refund of fee under special circumstances will be governed by the relevant Rules and Regulations of the university in this regard.

12. MEDIUM OF INSTRUCTION AND EXAMINATION

12.1 The language for the instruction and examination shall be English.

12.2 In cases where the programme pertains to any language other than English, the instructions and examinations would be in that language.

13. EXAMINATION AND EVALUATION

13.1 A student shall be continuously evaluated for academic performance in a course through a surprise test (s), pre-announced tests, tutorials, practical work, assignment (s), term paper, field work, seminar (s), periodical tests and the End-Semester Examination, as prescribed in the examination scheme of the respective course and duly approved by the authority concerned.

13.2 Following evaluation procedure shall be applicable:

- 1. Surprise Test(s):** One or more such tests with multiple choice questions
- 2. Continuous Assessment:** Continuous Assessment will be based on two pre-announced Tests having both short answer subjective type and one Long answer type subjective question, term papers, assignments, practical etc.
- 3. End Term Examination:** Having multiple choice questions.

13.3 All the examinations shall be conducted by the teacher(s) concerned under the overall supervision of the Centre Coordinator and Dean of the School. The Coordinator of the Centre shall report the award list in respect of all courses taken by

different students to the Controller of Examinations through the Dean of the School within seven days of the completion of examination.

13.4 In case a student could not appear in any component of the Continuous assessment of a course due to medical reasons or under other exceptional circumstances (supported by documentary evidence), a separate examination in that component may be arranged by the concerned Centre Coordinator before the beginning of End Semester Examination.

13.5 The End Semester Practical Examination (wherever applicable) shall ordinarily be held before the theory examinations.

13.6 A student shall be permitted to appear in the End-Semester Examination as per the Conduct of Examination Rules after filling up the prescribed examination form, payment of the prescribed examination fee, satisfying the attendance requirement and fulfilling other eligibility criteria.

13.7 The question paper pattern of End Semester Examination shall be prescribed by the School concerned, and it will be compulsory to pass this examination for successful completion of the course.

13.8 Unless prescribed in the Regulations and the Scheme of Examination of a particular programme, a candidate shall be deemed to have completed his/her course successfully if he/she obtains minimum Grade point of 4 as per the following 10 point system in each course.

13.9 If a student passes in at least 50% of prescribed courses of a semester he/she shall be allowed to repeat the End Semester Examination of the remaining course(s) along with regular students of preceding without putting in any additional attendance. The marks for all other components as applicable shall however, be carried forward

in such cases. The students shall be required to deposit the examination-form along with prescribed fee

13.10 A student failing in more than 50% of the courses in a semester shall have to seek readmission in the appropriate semester as a regular student.

13.11 The marks obtained in the Continuous Internal Assessment (CIA) shall be shown to the students.

14. AWARD OF MARKS SHEET

14.1 On successful completion of each semester examination, the student shall be awarded grades/grade points for that semester indicating simultaneously the CGPA/Semester Grade Points Average (SGPA) in the previous semester (s).

14.2 The Marks-Sheet of last semester shall indicate the grades obtained and credits earned for each course, and Cumulative Grade Point Average (CGPA) as prescribed in the Regulations duly approved by statutory bodies of the university.

15. IMPROVEMENT OF GRADE

15.1 Students who have been declared pass in a course (s) shall be allowed to repeat any component of continuous assessment and End Semester Examination in order to improve his/her grade/CGPA/division along with regular students in corresponding semesters, provided that CGPA of such a student is less than 6.0 on 10 point scale. No separate examination would be arranged for such students. There would be no limit for numbers of chances to improve.

15.2 Such students shall have to apply for improvement of grade/marks/division and pay the fees prescribed from time to time.

15.3 If the candidate improves grade/marks, then the improved grade/marks shall be taken into account for working out revised award and a revised marks sheet shall be issued to him/her on the surrender of the marks sheet issued earlier. Such improved marks will not be counted for the award of Prizes/Medals, Rank and Distinction. If the candidate does not show improvement in the grade/marks, his/her previous grade/marks will continue to be taken into account.

15.4 No candidate shall be allowed to improve grade/CGPA in the practical, project work and seminar and field work.

16. Evaluation of Dissertation

16.1 Prior to submission of the dissertation student shall make a pre-submission presentation in the Centre that shall be open to all faculty members and research students, for getting feedback and comments, which shall be suitably incorporated into the draft dissertation under the advice of his/her supervisor.

16.2 Every candidate shall submit with his/her dissertation a certificate from the supervisor (s) that the dissertation submitted is a record of original research work

carried out by the candidate under his/her supervision and that the dissertation has not previously formed the basis for the award of any degree/diploma, or other similar titles of this or any other university and that the dissertation represents independent work of the candidate.

16.3 A panel of not less than six having present or past affiliation with a reputed university or an accredited institution of higher learning, shall be submitted by the supervisor of the student to the Vice Chancellor for approval through the Coordinator of Centre and the Dean of concerned School for evaluating the dissertation and conducting the viva-voce examination to be held later. The Vice Chancellor may appoint an examiner other than those proposed by supervisor of the candidate(s) also. The Controller of Examinations shall contact each of the approved examiners to seek their consent and arrange the evaluation of dissertations and conduct of viva-voce examination of the students.

16.4 The external examiner (s) shall not be connected with the university, and shall be known for having made rich contributions to knowledge in their respective area (s) of study.

16.5 Each examiner, after examining the dissertation submitted by the candidate for the award of degree, shall submit a detailed report on a prescribed format along with a clear recommendation whether, in his/her opinion:

(a) The dissertation should be accepted for the award of degree and the public defense and viva-voce examination of the candidate should be held.

or

(b) The dissertation should be referred back to the candidate for revision

or

(c) The dissertation should be rejected.

16.6 If the dissertation is approved, the examiner (s) may seek clarification questions, if any, to be answered by the candidate at the time of public defense and viva-voce.

16.7 In case the examiner does not approve the dissertation of a candidate, it would be referred to another examiner from the panel previously submitted or as approved by the Vice Chancellor. If the second examiner also does not approve the dissertation, then the candidate will be required to resubmit the dissertation.

16.8 If the examiner (s) explicitly suggest revision and re-submission of dissertation for further examination, then the revised dissertation duly certified by the Supervisor, Centre Coordinator and the concerned Dean shall be sent to the same examiner for further evaluation unless he/she is unable or unwilling to act as such, in which case different examiner (s) may be appointed. If the examiner concerned specifically instructs that the revised thesis need not be sent back to him/her, the revised thesis

duly certified by the Supervisor, Centre Coordinator and the concerned Dean shall be accepted and the candidate shall be allowed for public defense and viva-voce.

17. CONDUCT OF VIVA-VOCE

17.1 After the dissertation is approved by the external examiner, a panel comprising the supervisor, the Coordinator of the concerned Centre and the Dean concerned or his nominee shall conduct viva-voce examination of the candidate in the presence of interested faculty members and students.

17.2 A candidate, who is not successful in the viva-voce examination, shall undergo the viva-voce examination second time, within a period of four months. In the event he/she fails again, the Dean shall refer the matter to the concerned School Board for decision.

17.3 If the performance of a candidate in viva-voce examination is satisfactory, the Coordinator of concerned Center, through the Dean concerned shall forward the recommendations of the examiner (s) who adjudicated the dissertation/ thesis and the evaluation of the candidate's performance in viva-voce examination along with other such documents as may be required, by the university to Controller of Examinations for consideration and approval by the Vice Chancellor.

18. AWARD OF DEGREE

18.1 The successful candidates shall be admitted to and conferred the Degree in the respective discipline, as the case may be, provided he/she has:

18.1.1 No pending dues to the university, hostel or library outstanding

18.1.2 No disciplinary action pending against him/her

18.1.3 Fulfilled such other conditions as prescribed under rules

18.2 For those candidates who have qualified for the degree in disciplines which are interdisciplinary in nature, the university may issue the degree in the respective discipline in which they have registered and have completed their programme.

18.3 Along with the degree, the university shall issue a provisional certificate to the effect that the degree has been awarded in accordance with the provisions of UGC (MINIMUM STANDARDS AND PROCEDURE FOR AWARD OF M.Phil./Ph.D. DEGREE), REGULATIONS, 2009, notified wide UGC Notification No F.I-1/2002 (PS) Exemp. Dated 1st June, 2009.

19. POWER TO REMOVE ANY DIFFICULTY

Notwithstanding what is contained in the Regulations; the Chairperson, Academic Council/Executive Council may in exceptional circumstances and on the recommendations of the School Board concerned or an appropriate Committee on the merits of each individual case consider, and for reasons to be recorded, allow relaxation of any of the provisions except those prescribing CGPA requirement.
